In 2016, the Adirondack Research Consortium renamed the Adirondack Achievement Award the **Dr. Elizabeth W. Thorndike Adirondack Achievement Award** honoring Liz's many

contributions to the betterment of the organization and the Adirondack community.

Liz has been a member of the Consortium's Board of Directors since 2001 and has served as Vice President from 2003 to 2006 and as President from 2006-2008. Under her leadership, the Consortium has become an established 501.c.3 with a sustainable funding stream which she supports generously.

Liz has served as a Commissioner of the Adirondack Park Agency from 1980 to 1995 and as a member of Governor Mario Cuomo's Environmental Advisory Board from 1985 to 1994. Liz has been a member of the NYS Energy Research and Development Authority's Board since 1997 where she chairs the Waste and Facilities Management Committee. She was founder, executive director, president, and member of the board of the Center for Environmental Information (CEI) in Rochester, NY from 1973 to 2007.

Her past and present board affiliations include the Girl Scouts of Genesee Valley, Association for Protection of the Adirondacks, Sierra Club (Rochester Regional Group), New York State College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Cornell (Advisory Council), Cayuga Lake Watershed Network, Adirondack Park Institute, Paul Smith's College, and Finger Lakes Land Trust (Advisory Board).

Eileen Barber Allen is the GIS Coordinator for the Center for Earth and Environmental Science at SUNY Plattsburgh specializing in geographic

information system mapping technologies. She has worked in the Remote Sensing Laboratory since 1984 and has been mapping wetlands and watersheds in the Adirondacks since 1991, involving numerous undergraduates in her work.

Many of her projects have involved the creation of detailed digital watershed and wetland databases from aerial photographs and USGS topographic maps. In partnership with the NYS Adirondack Park Agency and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Eileen participated in several projects to digitally map the major river basins in the Adirondacks. These nationally awarded projects have contributed significantly to the available digital resource information that is the basis of many of the current research projects going on in the Adirondacks today.

Education has always been a high priority for Eileen. All of her projects have been springboards for educational opportunities for SUNY Plattsburgh students. "We are pleased to recognize this pioneering research which continues to benefit the Adirondack community and embodies the spirit of this award", said Dan Spada, President of the Adirondack Research Consortium.

Eileen earned her M.A. in Natural Resources at SUNY Plattsburgh and is one of the first certified GIS professionals in New York State.
